Seder and Maundy Thursday

One of the principle religious festivals celebrated by Jews is Passover. This springtime festival begins with an elaborate liturgy/supper commonly called the Seder. Holy Trinity has a long tradition of holding a Seder meal on Maundy Thursday. The Seder (the word means “order” as in order of service) is woven around retelling the Hebrew (Jewish) peoples’ history of liberation from slavery in Egypt. Symbolic foods are shared: matzoh (unleavened bread, a reminder that the Hebrews left Egypt in haste and the bread did not have time to rise), karpas (green vegetable, often celery, a sign of spring) dipped in salt water (the tears of slavery), maror (horseradish or other bitter vegetable, a reminder of the bitterness of slavery), and others including four cups of wine.

Our gospels tell us that Jesus was crucified during the Passover season. Mathew, Mark and Luke indicate that the Last Supper Jesus shared with his disciples was the Passover meal. John, however, places the Last Supper the evening before Passover. Either way, Passover was in the air.

As Passover and Easter are both spring festivals, and since Jesus’ final days on earth were played out at the time of Passover, many Christians have adopted the practice of holding a Seder Meal during Holy Week. Holy Trinity has held its Passover on the Thursday before Easter, that is, Maundy Thursday, transitioning from the Seder to the church for the traditional celebration of Maundy Thursday Eucharist ending with stripping of the altar.

Ann and I began our ministry with you during Lent so we followed your tradition of Seder and Maundy Thursday Liturgy on the same evening. What we discovered was that we rushed the Seder in order to hold the Maundy Thursday Liturgy at a set time. This meant we did not do justice to the Seder. Doing both Seder and Maundy Thursday Liturgies on the same evening also meant the clean-up from the dinner had to take place after the stripping of the altar, disrupting what should have been a time of reflection.

This year, in order to give both the Passover Seder and the Maundy Thursday Liturgy the attention and honor each deserves, we will hold the Passover Seder on Wednesday Evening at 6 pm. The Maundy Thursday Eucharist and Stripping of the Altar will take place the following evening at 7 pm.

Reflections about Lent

For 25 years in my home parish, Lent was a season of incense, prayer, fasting, and self-denial. We were encouraged to examine our lives to become more acutely aware of things that we did or did not do that alienated us from God and one another. Repentance meant turning around, making a new effort to do things motivated by love. That led me to “give up” something. Then one year, I felt strangely motivated to put on something that would make me more aware. That year I gave up skipping lunch. I was dean of the Graduate School and grabbing a handful of cereal between meetings was my daily substance. So, during lent I scheduled meetings over lunch. What a concept. It meant planning, inviting someone to join me and have a conversation, rather than either work at my desk through the noon hour or shoot off another cluster of emails. Slow down was the effect, plan ahead, be engaged, live while working. Another year I put on an extra book of devotions, something outside my work orbit, with spiritual feeding and reflection. That was before we could stream the book audibly and listen as we drove or did mindless tasks.

This pattern is a move from giving something up to putting something on to be aligned with the author of our salvation. If giving something up is your Lenten tradition, then give up being too busy to nurture a life of prayer and relationships, give up pursuit of selfish ambitions and put on humility, regarding others as God’s beloved son or daughter. Put on the mind of Christ. God whose beloved Son came to reveal God’s love and solidarity with all of us. This pattern is also reflected in the Philippian hymn: “Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death – even death on a cross.” (Philippians 2: 5-8)

Jesus came down to earth, lived an obedient life of loving service, and was raised up after dying on the cross. This process of giving up in order to take on the life of service, of loving God and neighbor fully, is the way our spirits are aligned with the one we confess as LORD.

Transition Team Update

February has been an exciting month for the Transition Team. We received three portfolios from applicants. They were contacted, two responded and interviews have been scheduled. The third applicant was contacted and he responded that he had accepted a position in another diocese. We are expecting a portfolio from another applicant.

The actual number of applicants has varied due to the stipend that was originally set and life circumstances of applicants. One candidate dropped out for personal reasons, another accepted a call elsewhere so we did not receive their portfolios. At the February Vestry meeting the Vestry voted to increase the stipend to be in line with the average rector compensation nationally. Our Transition Consultant has reposted the opening with the new compensation package and extended the deadline for rectors to apply. There is a transition conference in March which usually brings a new group of clergy looking for a new position. The two upcoming interviews and reference checks will determine if we will be calling a rector soon, or if we need more applications from rectors to review and interview.

Mothering Sunday, what are its origins in the Church?

The Journey to the Mother Church

Each year on the fourth Sunday of Lent, countries around the world celebrate Mothering Sunday. In the 16th century, Mothering Sunday was less about mothers and more about church. Back then, people would make a journey to their 'mother' church once a year. This might have been their home church, their nearest cathedral or a major parish church in a bigger town. The service which took place at the 'mother' church symbolized the coming together of families. This would have represented a significant journey for many.

Simnel Cake

Simnel cake has a strong affiliation to Mothering Sunday as it is usually associated with spring and Easter. It resembles a Christmas fruit cake but should be slightly lighter in texture. It has long been a tradition here at Holy Trinity the children have brought the ingredients to make the Simnel cake prior to Mothering Sunday.
